Classification/Reclassificationreports available electronically

Reclassifications in general are few and far between. Of those that have been done, most are minor such as boundary clarifications or editorial changes. There have been a few though, and these are summarized below.

- **St. Augustine Reclassification** (1/30/80). The City of St. Augustine requested reclassification of Class II waters to Class III. Investigation resulted in some areas changing from Class III to II, and others from Class II to III.
- Manatee River & tributaries to Lake Manatee (7-26-81) Tributaries were changed from Class III to I-A. Surface Water Quality Classification System (3-1-89) (1-28-90) A study of the surface water quality classification system done at the request of the Legislature focused on coordinating Class II boundaries with approved shellfish harvesting areas. Several changes were made, most of which were editorial or for clarification of boundaries.
- Jumping Gully Creek (1991) changed from "unclassified" to Class III under separate rulemaking, but as a result of a Legislative request to review the surface water classification system study.

 Braden River Tributaries Tributaries changed from Class III to I (3-31-91).
- Lake Prospect Reclassification (6-7-00). Prospect Lake, also known as the abandoned rock pit on Prospect Field Road, was reclassified from Class I to Class III at the request of Broward County. The County had developed this water as a backup source of water, but had not used it. The County wished to connect the lake with an existing canal system to enhance ground water recharge in an adjacent well field,
